

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Indiana Civil War Facts

- Governor Oliver T. Morton, Republican with a Democratic controlled General Assembly
- Obtained \$2 million loans from Madison, IN banker James Lanier-Repaid in 1864
- Robert Cameron, Valporaiso-19th Indiana (Iron Brigade) and 34th Indiana





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


Lew Wallace15th Indiana Infantry Regiment-Missionary Ridge flag

- 196,363 Soldiers from Indiana entered the Union Army
- 26,672 deaths or 13.58% of total. Highest percent in the Union
- If 9.25% of population fought today, would be 599,752 total
- 105 Indiana Soldiers died in Andersonville prison
- 47 received the Medal of Honor at Vicksburg
- 4 Regiments organized in Michigan City and La Porte
- Morgan's Raiders-Southeastern Indiana

























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CAMP DOUGLAS-History

CAMP DOUGLAS-Facts

- ❖ Approximately 60 acres total size
- Union troops trained-nearly 40,000
- ❖ One of 8 Union camps to train African American soldiers
- One of longest operating prisons in Civil War
- Greatest number of prisoner deaths in Union prisons
- Contained 200 buildings
- ❖ 66 prison barracks
- ❖ Total prisoners-about 30,000, 12,082 most held at one time
- ❖ Documented prison deaths due to diseases 4,009 of 70,088 cases treated
- ❖ Total prisoner deaths-estimated approximately 5,000





Reasons for Loss of Life

- Poor Sanitary Conditions
- Lack of natural immunity due to rural environment
- Condition of prisoners & Diet Change
- Inadequate and primitive medical care






Factors Creating Conditions

- No history of prisoner incarceration
- Lack of plan for long term incarceration
- Poor training of leadership, guards and prisoners
- High leadership turnover

Estimated up to 6,000 Confederate remains buried there. 4,243 are identified by name
